The Nevada County Economic Resource Council (ERC) launched the Nevada County Tech Connection (NCTC) in early 2017 with a grant from Northern Rural Training and Employment Consortium (NORTEC). The ERC formed NCTC in response to the local tech businesses and professionals lamenting the lack of visibility into Nevada County's tech ecosystem. The manufacturing and technology industry is thriving in Nevada County. We have a history of digital and manufacturing technology, starting with the Grass Valley Group. We have world-class professionals who have moved to Nevada City and Truckee because of the lifestyle. We have gritty, resourceful, local entrepreneurs who have built enterprises from scratch and march to their own beat of innovation and lifestyle...not only because they can, but because they WANT to.

The common characteristic in our community is that we are here in spite of the odds against us (tight housing and limited broadband ring a bell?). 


